#### **National Curriculum**

## Why were seaside holidays become more popular in the Victorian era? How have seaside holidays changed since the Victorians?

#### KEY LEARNING -

Children will know about what it was like to go on holiday in the Victorian era and explore how we know what it was like. They will know what people did on Victorian holidays to the seaside and know how their clothes and entertainment have changed compared to the present day. They will compare holiday pictures from the Victorian era to now and explore similarities and differences. They will explore whether the Victorians went on holiday for the same reasons that we do today. The children will explore causes for change e.g., the development of transport (trains and trams) and the impact that this had on seaside holidays.

## **Historical enquiry**

- Make simple observations about a source or artefact.
- Use sources to show an understanding of historical concepts. Ask why, what, who, how and where questions and find answers to them.

Compare holiday pictures from the Victorian era to now, exploring similarities and differences. Compare Victorian entertainment to present day. Explore whether the Victorians went on holiday for the same reason that we do now.
