## **Greek Modroc Pencil Pots**





#### What do I know already? I know how to:

#### will know how to create a Greek inspired mod roc pencil pot by:


- being able to cut, make and combine shapes to create recognisable forms.

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## **Artist Focus**



#### <u>The François Vase</u>

The François Vase was made around 570 B.C.E. in Athens, Greece. The vase was considered an unusual shape and was created by Kleitias (the painter) and Ergotimos (the potter). The François Vase is a volute krater (a vessel used for mixing water and wine with curling handles) and is likely one of the earliest vases of its type made in Athens. Hundreds of figures run, fight, and dance across the surface of the Vase which an ancient viewer would have known all of the stories for.



#### <u>Joshua Wedgwood</u>

Born 12 July 1730 and died on 3 January 1795. He was was an English potter. Founding the Wedgwood company in 1759, in Burslem, England. He became famous for the industrialisation of pottery. Wedgwood was the first to use modern marketing to sell and promote his pottery.




#### Wedgwood's Encaustic Decorated Black Basalt Volute Krater Vase


In the early 18th century, ruins of ancient empires in Greece and Italy were discovered and lead to a new movement called Neoclassicism. Wedgwood was intrigued by these ancient pieces, and they provided inspiration for Wedgwood to create ceramics with entirely new decorative themes. He had two main trademark styles. One was which he called 'Black Basalt' Ware as shown here inspired by the ancient Greeks. The other was his Jasper ware – as studied in KS1.




