



# DT- Year 5/6 Summer Cycle A -Textiles Anglo Saxon Purses








### What do I already know? I know how to make a hand puppet and a Greek sandal by:

- developing my knowledge of how to use a template and prototype
- Knowing how to join textiles with simple sewing stitches (running stitch, basting stitch, blanket stitch, cross stitch).
- starting to apply my knowledge of selecting and using different finishing techniques to improve the appearance of my product.
- using my knowledge of the functional properties and appearance of textiles.
- beginning to develop an understanding of materials and ways they can be attached to each other.



## I will know how to design and make a fabric coin container inspired by Anglo Saxon purses by:

- understanding the importance of and how to use a template
- knowing how to measure, tape, pin, cut, shape and join fabric with precision to make a purse.
- being able to join textiles using a greater variety of stitches, such as backstitch, overcast/blanket stitch, hemming stitch;
- having the ability to refine the finish using techniques to improve the appearance of my purse.
- being able to select a textile according to its functional properties and aesthetic qualities.
- considering what will help to sell my purse.










### **Anglo Saxon Purses**




